


# Successes of the Legislative Program 2019 (FY20) total funding specific to Martin County: \$3,595,000 \$2 million for septic to sewer (Golden Gate) \$1.2 for a stormwater treatment area (East Fork Creek) \$270,000 for Loxahatchee River Preservation Initiative (LRPI) project 2020 (FY21) total funding specific to Martin County: \$2,600,000 \$2.5 million for septic to sewer (Old Palm City) \$100,000 for Savannas South Weir





# Significant Federal Success

- FY21 Federal Budget includes \$250 Million for Everglades Restoration. (FY21 Budget was \$200 million)
- \$149 Million for IRLS in the US Army Corps of Engineers Work Plan
  - \$19 Million to finish the C-44 Reservoir
  - \$130 Million to construct the C-23/24 STA
- In the same legislation, WRDA 2020 was approved
  - Authorization of the Loxahatchee River Watershed Restoration Plan which will ultimately provide
    for 90% of the dry season fresh water flows needed and includes \$350 Million worth of wetland
    restoration in Martin County. This authorization makes the project eligible for a local sponsor
    project partnership agreement and future appropriations for funding.
  - Provision that obligates the USACE to consider the impacts of discharging harmful algal blooms to the estuaries and research ways to predict, prevent and mitigate future discharge events.
  - WRDA 2020 also included language that resolved the procedural challenge that could have delayed construction of the EAA reservoir.







Indian River Lagoon - South

• SUPPORT continued dedicated funding for the Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Plan (CERP) and SUPPORT long-term funding commitments to finance the completion of the projects on the Integrated Delivery Schedule (IDS), with a priority given to the Indian River Lagoon-South (IRL-S) Project including funding for the C-23/24 and C-25 reservoirs and STAs.

• SUPPORT the land acquisition of the Natural Lands Component of IRL-South, which includes 90,000 acres of wetland restoration.

- SUPPORT efforts and dedicated funding for the
Florida Department of Environmental
Protection to protect and restore the
Southeast Florida Coral Reef Tract.

- SUPPORT efforts and dedicated funding for
resources to prepare Florida's coastal
communities and habitats for the effects of
climate change, especially rising sea levels

- SUPPORT language to name the Southeast
Florida Coral Reef Ecosystem Conservation
Area, established in 2018, after the late State
Representative Kristin Jacobs as the "Kristin
Jacobs Southeast Florida Coral Reef Ecosystem
Conservation Area".

## Priorities Continued...

### Biosolids

 SUPPORT establishing a pilot project program for funding new, state of the art wastewater technologies to improve recovery and afford more efficient use of human wastewater biosolids.

### • Amendment to Tree Trimming Protections

• SUPPORT amending Section 163. 045, F.S., Tree pruning, trimming or removal on residential property to: clarify the meaning of "residential property", to protect champion and heritage trees, to clarify the meaning of "an arborist certified by the International Society of Arboriculture", and to clarify what is meant by a "tree presents a danger to persons or property".

### · Affordable Housing

- **SUPPORT** the existing state housing trust funds for affordable housing programs, specifically the local S.H.I.P. programs.
- Indian River Lagoon National Estuary Program (IRL NEP)

# Priorities Continued...

### Loxahatchee River Preservation Initiative


 SUPPORT continued funding of projects identified through the LRPI; a partnership of governmental agencies brought together for the common goal of the restoration and enhancement of the Loxahatchee River.

### School Board Millage

 SUPPORT returning the school board to a 2.0 millage rate for Florida Education Finance Program (FEFP) funding and ensuring the county's contribution is equitable to what is received.

### PFAS

 SUPPORT state efforts in rulemaking to ensure local governments are not disproportionally impacted for funding cleanups. SUPPORT funding for local government response costs.
 SUPPORT research to determine accurate rates of impact to human health and the environment from the presence of PFAS in non-potable groundwater.



• SB 62 - Regional Planning On the Councils • Revising a requirement for the Executive Office of the Governor to Radar in review and consider certain reports, data, and analyses relating to the revision of the state comprehensive plan; eliminating the advisory role of the First regional planning councils in state comprehensive plan preparation and revision; repealing provisions relating to the Florida Regional Planning Week... Council Act; authorizing local governments to recommend areas of critical state concern to the state land planning agency, etc.
